Reviews

Academic

[U Penn] English, Foreign Language, and Math departments are strong. Classes are small and discussion-based. The teachers are invested in the success of each individual student—participation in class is required. There is a Learning Center that provides faculty and student tutors. Competitive academic environment.

College Counseling

[U Penn] Begins spring semester of junior year. There are two primary counselors—one who focuses on helping with the personal statements and the other who acts as a guide for essentially everything else. The school provides a week-long break for the juniors to go on a college tour that is planned out by the counseling office. Teachers are willing to write letters of recommendation.

Admissions Process

[[U Penn] Required to take the ISEE or SSAT. Very selective school and the admissions office is certainly looking for very high scores. An interview is required. Do not dress conservatively—they are looking for personality. Parental involvement is not expected or helpful and can even be detrimental. Feeder schools include Julia Morgan School for Girls and St. Paul's Episcopal School.

Extra-Curricular Activities

[U Penn] Academics are more important than extracurriculars—difficult to manage time. Community service is important; every year, each class works together on one specific project. A typical student spends about 15 hours per week on extracurricular activities.

Quality of School Life

[U Penn] The campus and surrounding neighborhood is beautiful and quiet and is close to a lake and several regional parks. No dining services, but snacks are available during breaks. There are two very well-equipped computer labs on campus as well as a tech support office. The library is a great place to study—it is kept very quiet and has different areas for both private and group study. The majority of the school is white and upper-middle class, but diversity is becoming more pronounced. Reasonable approach to discipline.
